Holiday helps | Creative gift ideas

- Make fun t-shirts using iron-on letters (Michael's or Jo-Ann)
- Instead of buying a gift for everyone in the family, perform a "drawing" where each family member chooses a name from a hat and only buys a gift for that one person (setting a price limit).
- Make homemade applesauce (www.todaysletters.com/search/label/Recipes)
